ARTIST STATEMENT

Inspired by an observation of visual or modal pattern, my works intuitively reflect the color, flow, and rendition of generational/relational connection and dysfunction. The end results are abstractions of a dialogue between extrapolated meaning and the observations embedded in my subconscious. This dialogue comes forth as layer upon layer of encaustic paint is laid. These layers build on each other as the subconscious is allowed a voice. The final revealed layer does not interpret the findings in dialogue, rather it reflects a stopping point in the inner conversation. Hints of the intuitive exchange can often be found by gazing into the paintings.

BIO

Kansas City-based painter, Amanda Jolley, works mainly with encaustic and paper. Theinspiration for her work comes from observation of the patterns and story found in everyday life, and how they complement and often mirror the connections in the brain and processing of subconscious thought. She has also noticed a distinct connection between bodily knowing and intuition and has developed a practice of trusting her body to inform her process of abstract painting.

Without formal education in art, Amanda's artistic training has been intentional; finding artists whose work compels her and then studying under them. She also regularly meets and works with other artists to propel process, ideas, and larger artistic vision. She is a member of the Kansas City Artists Coalition, the International Encaustic Artists, and Origami USA. Amanda's paintings are shown internationally both in solo and group exhibits. ARTIST STATEMENT

Long before I considered myself an artist, I made marks on any available surface inside and out, used creek mud to draw lines, textures, patterns, and built an occasional 'structure' with this abundant medium. I collected odd pieces of metal, rocks, insects, feathers of birds, and just about anything in my environment. I have always loved anything organic, natural, or unique. The Earth and the natural world have always been my inspiration. Formal training has brought its rewards, but self-exploration has produced the greatest results.

By taking all of the insights that my mentors have gifted me, I have been able to collect bits and pieces of their inspiration to create my own artistic style. Being able to use my visual "voice" to communicate is the making of the never-ending chapters of my visual autobiography.

BIO

Gina began experimenting with the ancient techniques of Encaustic in 2006 (this medium dates as far back to the 5th Century B.C. and is the most organic and archival of mediums.) Each layer of medium involves fusing together numerous layers of molten beeswax and Damar resin, often with the addition of pigments. The surface is scraped, scratched, or rubbed with pigment to create various effects. Unlike other mediums, encaustic has sculptural, mysterious, and corporeal components to it.

Gina is a Roanoke, Va. native and has been creating for as long as she can remember. In later years she continued her journey having the good fortune of having been mentored and taught by some of the finest of artists. Her recent works are explorations in combining numerous techniques along with the Encaustic and wax mediums to create the atmospheric and textural qualities which are often symbolic to her works. She has assembled bits of her lifelong learning experiences and personal intuition to create her own artistic voice. Louthian-Stanley's works represent physical and emotional sensation that carry the viewer into their own significant narrative.

Gina has received many awards and honors, been featured in many publications, has taught nationally, and internationally, along with many works collected and shown nationally and internationally.

Bridgette Guerzon Mills is a multi-media artist. Her work incorporates a variety of materials including photography, paint, encaustic, and textiles, as well as reclaimed materials. Her artwork has been published in magazines and books and her work has been collected in the United States and internationally. She resides in Towson, MD.

As a mixed media artist, encaustic is a versatile medium that allows her to create depth in layers and serves as a means for further exploration in both form and meaning. She combines her photography with encaustic to create a bridge between two worlds, the real and the reconstructed. The canvas becomes a multilayered surface that speaks to both the visual and tactile senses. Her landscapes are an attempt to capture a feeling of wonder, recognition and kinship with the land. She explores landscapes in both oil paint and encaustic.

Her outdoor installations, often created using foraged or recycled materials, focus on environmental issues and seek to engage and educate the public about these concerns.

Fleta Monaghan is a lifelong painter and sculptor and the founder of 310 ART Gallery and teaching center for adults in Asheville NC. In 2009 her school began an encaustic program, with well-known artists in the field. She states: "I was able to take classes in encaustic at the studio and while at first I resisted going full speed ahead in the medium, it soon just lured me in with the countless possibilities in both 2D and 3D methods. Since then, I have experimented in many methods, and love the luminous possibilities this medium offers. The pieces you see are small relief sculptures that are built up by countless thin layers of wax and resin, with small, embedded sea objects such as sea glass and pearls and shells. I experimented with mixtures of various waxes and resins to make a strong material that holds up very well in relief sculpture."

All instructors in encaustic at her school are instructors in the international program, "Painting with Fire", and have participants come from all over the country to study.
